Regulations and procedures have been subject to change very regularly over the summer months - so much that it was hard to keep up for a while! These are our current visiting procedures for Long Term Care and Retirement as of July 23rd:

- Fully vaccinated visitors are no longer required to be Rapid Tested every time they enter the building. Given the recent spike in COVID-19 cases, we are testing all staff and residents in the building on Wednesdays only. This may change in the near future.
- All staff and visitors in the building must wear a medical mask throughout the duration of their shift/visit.
- All visits between residents and friends/families must be booked in advance by 2:00pm on the prior business day.
- There is no limit to how many visitors each resident can have at one time. There are, however, limits on how many people can be in one room at once (dependent on the size of the room). The standard right now is that no more than five people (including residents) can visit within a resident's room.
- Common rooms in both of our Homes can be booked for visits. These are arranged through the Front Office.
- Residents and friends/families who are fully vaccinated may share meals together, whether they provide their own food or book meals through our Kitchen.
- Residents are allowed to leave the building for day and overnight visits. These must be arranged through the Front Office.
