Darn, I'm older than dirt!

Someone asked the other day, "What was your favourite fast food when you were growing up?"

"We didn't have fast food when I was growing up," I informed him, "All the food was slow."

"Come on, seriously. Where did you eat?" he insisted.



"It was a place called 'at home,'" I explained. "Mom cooked every day and when Dad got home from work we sat down together at the dining room table, and if I didn't like what she put on my plate I was allowed to sit there until I did like it."

By this time, the kid was laughing so hard I was afraid he was going to suffer serious internal damage, so I didn't tell him the part about how I had to have permission to leave the table.

Here are some other things I would have told him about my childhood if I thought his system could have handled it:

- Some parents never owned their own house, wore Levi's, set foot on a golf course, traveled out of the country, or had a credit card.
- My parents never drove me to school. I had a bicycle that weighed probably 50 pounds and only had one speed: slow.



- •We didn't have a television in our house until I was 10 years old. It came back on the air at about 6am and there was usually a locally produced news and farm show on featuring local people.
- I never had a telephone in my room. Our only phone was on a party line. Before you could dial, you had to listen and make sure some people you didn't know weren't already using the line.
- Pizzas were not delivered to our home, but milk was, and so was bread.
- All newspapers were delivered by boys and all boys delivered newspapers - my brother delivered a newspaper six days a week. He had to get up at 5am every day.
- Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. There were no movie ratings because all movies were responsibly produced for everyone to enjoy viewing, without profanity or violence or most anything offensive.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children and grandchildren. Don't blame me if they bust a gut laughing.

Our Retirement Residence Planning Committee met for the last time on Friday, October 7th to discuss their visits to other retirement residences. Those visited were Seacliff Manor and Chartwell in Leamington and Winston Park Schlegel Villages and Parkwood Seniors Community in Kitchener/Waterloo. Highlights from these visits included spacious common areas that were homey and inviting with lots of windows and skylights, differing levels of accommodation with locks on the doors, wheelchair accessibility and safety items throughout the building, kinesiologists on staff, bio of residents done when they move in, and affordability. The committee also looked at the results from the staff survey – among the suggestions are more communal space for residents, a larger staff room, an education room, more storage, more activities for residents, more parking for staff and residents, and individual room thermostats.

With all the information collected from current and potential residents, staff, and other facilities, the committee has developed a wish list for a new LMH Retirement Residence:

- A central hub on the first floor for communal activities
 - o Common areas for crafts, woodworking, computer room, pub, café, etc.
 - o Daycare for staff with opportunity for residents to connect with kids
 - Space for the Mennonite Historical Society and partnership where seniors can share their stories
- More home-like, less institutional, windows/natural light, welcoming colours
- Studio, 1 bedroom, and 1 bedroom + den units
- Locks on resident doors and patio/balcony on units
- An inviting outdoor space for resident use
- Affordability
- Flexible mealtimes

Our next step in the planning process is to consult with local architecture/building companies and put together a Building Committee.














Christmas Decorations



- Proof of vaccination is no longer a requirement to enter our building.
- Residents may have up to four individuals at a time for a visit in their room.
- Visitors should not enter the Home within ten days of visiting an individual with a confirmed case of COVID-19 and/or an individual experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.
- Everyone entering the Home is required to receive a Rapid Antigen Test and wait at least fifteen minutes before proceeding to the resident area. Children under the age of two are exempt from rapid testing. Testing hours are from 9am-6pm seven days a week.
- Everyone entering our building is required to wear one of our medical masks for the duration of their visit. Children under the age of two are exempt from masking altogether. Visitors may remove their masks in their resident's room.
- Screening will include temperature checking and inventory of current symptoms and exposure. Anyone showing symptoms of COVID-19 must not be allowed to enter the Home or visit outdoors with the resident.
- If you are taking a resident out of the building, please contact the nurse on the resident's floor in a timely manner.
- Outdoor visits in the Greenspace between LTC and RR are discontinued until next Spring.
- Pets are allowed in our building provided they are up to date on veterinary vaccinations and registered with the Front Office beforehand.
