What Did We Do This Spring?







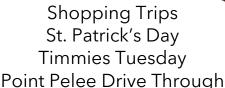

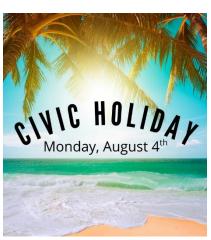

A word from our Chaplain

Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26)

According to the church year, the good news of Christ's resurrection does not fade when store merchandise transitions from the soft pastels of Easter to the bright, primary colours of summer. It actually continues for a period of fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. The Easter season aligns with spring, a season that stirs new hope within us. We never grow tired of watching the miracle of trees that were dormant during the winter explode with fragrant blossoms overnight. The music of songbirds can be heard again and the earth seems to sigh with relief at the first spring rains. In this season of rebirth, our minds are also drawn to the message of hope in the words of Jesus:

"I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26)

Jesus spoke these words to Martha, whose brother Lazarus had just died. Grief was new and raw. She was grappling with the harsh reality of her loss. Into that darkness, Jesus entered, offering not only words of comfort but himself. "I am the resurrection and the life."

Those same words speak to us today. No matter our age, no matter our health, no matter what we've lost or what we're still waiting for—Jesus offers the hope of eternal life for all those who believe in him. And that new life begins now, not just on the day we die. It begins the moment we place our trust in Him. Jesus is saying to Martha that there is a kind of life that death has no power over-a life rooted in him. And that life can flourish now no matter the circumstances.

Jesus leaves Martha with a question that we are all confronted with at some point: "Do you believe this?" This spring, may we not only see signs of life in the world around us

but also sense the stirring of life within. Because Christ is risen, so shall we be. And even now, we are.

A **Family Council** consisting of resident family members, meets every three months to review resident services, care, and activities. The Family Council assists in the identification of needs, preferences, and projects for the Long Term Care Home.

The Leamington Mennonite Home has a Family Council consisting of resident family members who work to improve the lives of residents. The Council:

- Allows families to give each other ongoing mutual support and encouragement
- Handles group concerns
- Provides the opportunity to become knowledgeable about the Home's operations
- Advises or recommends what residents would like to see done to improve care or quality of life in the Home
