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The RR Building Committee has discussed many different options so far for what it might look like to build a new Retirement Residence. There are so many different variables to take into consideration, including parking, number of building stories, financing, and what to do with the old building. We are currently weighing our options and considering municipal restrictions while we wait on a feasibility study to be conducted by Glos Associates.

- It is recommended that all staff and visitors wear a surgical mask while in our building. However, it is not a requirement. Masks are provided at the main entrances for those wishing to wear one.

Long Term Care

Helene Stadler



Helene was born on February 7, 1923 in the Ukraine. She was the eldest of seven children born to Peter and Susanna Janzen. During World War 2, her family was forced to leave their home and eventually ended up in Salzburg, Austria where Helene met her future husband, Eduard Stadler. They were married on April 16, 1947. Two years later they set sail from France and arrived in Halifax on the ship *Samaria*. From there, they took a train to

Learnington and were reunited with Helene's parents and some of her siblings. Soon after, they bought a seven-acre piece of bush land outside of Learnington.

Helene and Eduard had four children (three sons and one daughter), as well as seven grandchildren and many great grandchildren. Helene worked outside of the home for most of her life. In 1965 when the Learnington Mennonite Home officially opened, Helene worked in the kitchen as a cook. She later worked at *Lakeside Bakery* until she retired. Eduard passed away in October 1981, but Helene continued to live on the farm until December 2015, when she moved into our Home.

Retirement Residence

Katie was born in Hague, Saskatchewan on April 23, 1933. Her family moved to Greendale, B.C. before moving to Leamington in 1948. Katie attended UMEI before going to London to attend Teachers' College. She began her teaching career in Ruthven in 1953, where she taught for eleven years. She then went to Bethel College in Kansas, graduating in 1961 and returning to Leamington to teach in Windsor and Ruthven.



Katie married Henry Brown in 1962. In 1965, their son, Larry, came along and Katie left teaching because women with children were not allowed to teach. In 1967, their daughter, Sandra, joined the family. Katie returned to teaching in 1969 and retired in 1989 after 35 years in the education field.

In 2014, after being on their farm for seventy years, they moved to a condo on Pickwick Drive. Henry moved into our Long Term Care Home in 2015, and Katie moved into the Retirement Residence in 2017. Henry passed away in January 2020.
