So much has changed in our Home over the last few months! On April 1st, we stopped rapid testing everyone coming into our building, which means that the only COVID-19 precautions in place are the wearing of surgical masks and passive screening. We are eagerly waiting for the day when these two requirements are lifted as well! We've started using the Chapel again for resident activities, such as sing-alongs and worship services. The Chapel has been very useful throughout the pandemic for many different purposes, but we are happy to have it transformed back into a resident space.

You may recall that there was a series of gastrointestinal flu cases in RR at the end of February. Coincidentally, the third floor of LTC also experienced a gastrointestinal outbreak at the beginning of March. This is the first non-COVID related outbreak we have had in at least five years. We are very grateful that we are generally able to keep the flu and other illness away from our residents, and we're very proud of our infection control practices that make this possible.

For the first time since 2019, we had our Annual Meeting in person rather than via video call! On April 25th we gathered in the Heritage Centre Auditorium and heard reports on the finances for 2022, budgets for 2023, different projects that have been completed and are currently in progress, and updates from our Board Chair and

Administrator about our Home's functions. We are happy to have been able to come together in person and look forward to many other pre-COVID practices returning!



Resident & Family Councils

All residents are invited and encouraged to attend and participate in the monthly **Resident Council** Meetings. Meetings, led by the Resident Chair, focus on resident preferences for activities, events, and programming. Resident services such as meals, personal care, housekeeping, and laundry are discussed and evaluated.

A **Family Council** consisting of resident family members, meets every three months to review resident services, care, and activities. The Family Council assists in the identification of needs, preferences, and projects for the Long Term Care Home.

The Leamington Mennonite Home has a Family Council consisting of resident family members who work to improve the lives of residents. The Council:

- Allows families to give each other ongoing mutual support and encouragement
- Handles group concerns
- Provides the opportunity to become knowledgeable about the Home's operations
- Advises or recommends what residents would like to see done to improve care or quality of life in the Home



- Visitors are no longer required to receive a Rapid Antigen Test to enter our building. If you are experiencing symptoms and would like a testing kit, please ask the Front Office.
- Proof of vaccination is not a requirement to enter our building.
- Everyone entering our building is required to wear a surgical mask for the duration of their visit. Masks are provided at the Front Entrance. Children under the age of two are exempt from masking. Visitors may remove their masks in the resident's room.
- Residents may have up to four individuals at a time for a visit in their room due to space limitations.
- Visitors should not enter the Home within ten days of visiting an individual with a confirmed case of COVID-19 and/or an individual experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.
- Passive screening will include inventory of current symptoms and exposure. Anyone showing symptoms of COVID-19 must not be allowed to enter the Home or visit on our property with the resident.
- If you are taking a resident out of the building, please contact the nurse on the resident's floor in a timely manner.

 While we will not be booking visits in the Greenspace this year, residents and visitors are welcome to use this space for their visits. Our staff will not escort residents to this space - visitors are required to come inside to assist the resident.

 Pets are allowed in our building provided they are up to date on veterinary vaccinations and registered with the Front Office beforehand.



Long Term Care




Retirement Residence
